How to get a free Wisconsin ID card

If you do not have one of the above photo IDs, are a U.S. citizen, will be at least 18 years of age by the next election, and would like a Wisconsin ID card to vote, please check the "ID for FREE" box when completing the Wisconsin Identification Card (ID) application MV3004.

To get a free ID card, you will need to take a few documents to your nearest Division of Motor Vehicles office.

There's a long list of documents you can use below, but most people will be fine with a certified U.S. birth certificate, a Social Security card, and a utility bill or cell phone bill. You'll notice that some records, like a certified birth certificate, satisfy more than one category.

Just be sure to bring originals or certified copies — photocopies don't work — and check the box that reads "ID for Free" on your application. Once it's complete, you'll get a receipt (valid for 45 days) that you can use at the polls until your state ID arrives by mail.

Wisconsin ID card for voting purposes - petition process

How to apply

Getting a free ID for Voting is easy even if you do not have the documentation to get a regular Wisconsin ID!

**Go to the DMV to apply**

**Bring the following, if available:**

- **Proof of Name and Date of Birth (such as Birth Certificate)**
- **Proof of Identity (Social Security Card, Medicaid/Medicare Card, etc.)**
- **Wisconsin Residency (Utility bill, government mail, lease, etc.)**
- **Proof of U.S. Citizenship (U.S. Birth certificate or citizenship paperwork)**
- **Social Security Number**

*If you don't have all or any of these, you can still get an ID for voting. Just bring what you have to the DMV, fill out 2 forms, and you will get a photo ID document in the mail that you can use in time for voting. Here is a sample of the document you'll be receiving.*

**If you already hold an unexpired Wisconsin driver license or identification (ID) card, or if you hold a Wisconsin driver license or identification (ID) card that has expired since the last general election (currently November 4, 2014), you have what you need to vote. A Wisconsin driver license or ID card is acceptable photo ID for voting.**

**DMV does not have information regarding voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information. Please contact your local election officials or county clerk for election information. The Wisconsin Elections Commission is another useful source of information.**
